### Year 9 CURRICULUM



Our Year 9 students are encouraged to be independent learners; they even help to shape the way our lessons are taught. We seek constant feedback from our students to ensure that our program reaches everyone. All of our subjects align with the New Zealand curriculum and at the heart of all our lessons is God and the plans that He has for each of us.

We grow student leaders through our Strength-to-Strength program. Students can apply to be Values, Service or Sports Leaders and monitors. Our Values and Diligence contract also allows our junior high school students the opportunity to complete activities and achieve a variety of school value pins.

"Each of you should use whatever gift you have received to serve others, as faithful stewards of God's grace in its various forms" (1 Peter 4:10) Service Learning is integral to our Year 9 journey, during these lessons students are equipped with a range of real life skills and draw on expertise learnt in Maths, Visual Arts, Science, Technology, Financial Literacy and English to develop and lead projects that support the school, local community or wider world. This is real life learning, with interactions beyond their school environment. Instead of becoming overwhelmed by the problems presented by the world, students are encouraged to find solutions and be Christ-like in their work.

Our English Lessons cover all NZ curriculum outcomes: Text purposes and audiences, ideas within, across, and beyond texts, features and structures of language, comprehending and creating texts, critical analysis, reading for pleasure and connecting through storytelling. This is achieved through a number of units based on New Zealand texts, including short stories, novel study, and film study. The English curriculum is closely linked to the social sciences so students have the opportunity to share formal writing, present persuasive speeches and share personal responses about social and environmental issues they research.

Maths lessons incorporate culture as we learn about traditional Māori measurement and transformations with a focus on tapa cloth. The algebra, statistics and number skills learnt throughout the year are put use in the Great Marshmallow Catapult Inquiry contest at the end of the year!

Science will focus on the nature of science, the living world, material world, physical world and planet earth and beyond. Learning in the classroom is supported with trips and practical lessons.

Social Science sees us explore Aotearoa Histories; our identity and culture as New Zealanders. Our History unit exploring 'New Zealand at War' aligns with our English curriculum in Term 2. Term 3 brings a focus on Geography and Environmental Studies (equipping students with genuine skills to combat environmental issues). Finally we introduce Financial Literacy to round out the year.

Health and PE will cover turbo touch, ki O Rahi, handball and a number of traditional games and sports. Health class looks at relationships with others, personal hauora, making good decisions, healthy eating, the impacts of social media and respectful intimate relationships through a Christian lens.

Te Ao Māori sees students exploring the powhiri process, Matariki, te reo, and understanding Māori whakatauki/proverbs alongside Māori translation of biblical proverbs.

Our Performing Arts allow students to have exposure to Drama, Dance and Music. Technology is also split into food and soft textiles. Students choose one of three Language options to complete through Te Kura.

Christian Formation is Christian Religious Education that delves into the Christian faith, the Bible, Christian Theology, interdenominational Christian worldviews, and Christian responses to worldviews. It is delivered through lessons, assemblies and daily Devotions.



In order to prepare for NCEA distance learning pathways, students choose one of the following options to complete through Te Kura Distance School.

### **OPTION A:**

Languages (All Year)

To prepare for the NCEA qualification levels, students must study the same language in Years 9 and 10. Select this option if you plan to continue to pursue your language choice in Year 11 to 13.

### **OPTION B:**

All three of these subjects will be studied over the course of the year

### DVC

Design and Visual Communication is also known as Graphics. Modules include: Sketching - Culture & Influence on Design - Designers - Design Process - 3D - Isometric Sketching - The Memphis Design Movement - Spatial Design

### Commerce

Combines accounting, business studies and economics. Modules include: Money - Making Money - Saving - Spending - Borrowing - Budgeting - Producers - Financial Goals - Consumers - Risk - Enterprising - Record Keeping - Business Planning & Management

To be eligible for distance learning, Year 10 students must demonstrate established distance learning skills, including:

- consistent self-management, self-motivation, engagement and academic achievement
- independently self-monitor requirements
- communicates with and seeks support from their Te Kura teacher
- communicates, meets with and seeks support from their classroom supervisor
- consistently finishing and submitting work on time
- independently responding to feedback and resubmitting work.

### **LEADERSHIP**






### **HIGH SCHOOL UNIFORM**

All uniform is available from the uniform shop, 7A Glasgow Road, Pukekohe:

- White KingsGate Shirt
- Navy knee length KingsGate Skirt
- Navy shorts (shorts option also available for girls from January 2024)
- Lavalava / Tupenu (available from January 2024)
- Navy KingsGate full zip jersey
- All black shoes
- Navy or black crew socks
- Navy cap or bucket hat
- Navy KingsGate raincoat/jacket
- PE Kit: KingsGate PE shirt & and black shorts/tights



- All pieces of uniform must be named.
- Caps/hats are compulsory during term 1 and 4.

Students are responsible for ensuring they wear protective aprons (available in the maker-space) or old clothing during activities where uniforms could be at risk of damage. Students can also wear and store their own old clothing in their bags.

### Make-Up:

• Students can wear natural, inconspicuous make-up.

### **Tattoos:**

- Only traditional cultural tattoos are allowed.
- Students are not allowed to draw on their skin.

### **Piercings:**

- Only ear piercings are allowed.
- Only full circle plain sleepers (max. 2mm thick & 12 mm diameter) and plain ball studs (max. 5mm diameter).
- No variations to sleeper/stud type or other ear additions.
- No other facial piercings

#### Hair:

- Must be neat, clean and brushed.
- Hair past shoulder length must be tied back.
- Hair must not be in students' eyes. Long fringes must be clipped back.
- Natural hair colours are allowed. No bright, conspicuous colours.

### Jewellery:

- Only Christian/cultural chains and bracelets/bands can be worn (within reason: No noisy, distracting, prominent jewellery).
- Only school pins may be worn on the uniform.
- No additional jewellery (e.g. cuffs, anklets, rings)

### Nails:

- Only neutral/natural nail polish can be worn.
- If polish starts to chip or peel, please remove it.
- No colour variations or nail additions (e.g. marker, bright/dark colours, art, designs, tips, rhinestones.)
- Nails to be clean, tidy, and trimmed.

### **Facial hair:**

- Facial hair is to be neat and well-groomed.
- No braids, beads, cut-ins etc.

#### **Shoes:**

- Only full black shoes in any style, no heel.
- Black sandals without socks can be worn.
- No variation (e.g. colours, jandals, boots, crocs, scuffs)

#### Socks:

- Navy or black crew socks for everyone.
- No patterns or pictures.





### **HIGH EXPECTATIONS**

We expect our Junior High students to step up and make the most of the experiences offered at KingsGate School. As such we ask that you support us in the following ways:

### **Absenteeism**



Please ensure that your child comes to school every day unless ill. If they miss more than 3 consecutive days, please provide a doctors note.

Academic requirements of unjustified leave, truancy or some explained absence:

- Unfinished work is required to be completed.
- Class trips, special workshops and EOTC events will be missed to make up work.
- Students falling below 85% attendance will not be eligible for certain activities.
- Certain assessments that are missed are recorded as DNS (did not sit/submit)

### **Getting Involved**

Getting involved - All aspects of the curriculum are compulsory. Please do not supply notes for your child to enable them to sit out of activities unless they are genuinely ill.

As we are a small cohort, sitting out or not showing up **significantly** impacts groups and teams.



#### Homework

Students are expected to manage their class time and homework commitments responsibly.

If they do not complete tasks timeously, they will be expected to catch up in free time.

Parents will be notified if students show a pattern of non-submission.

### **STATIONERY & DEVICES**

KingsGate is a Chromebook school. As such, each Kauri student has access to a school Chromebook to use in class. Caregivers and students sign a Chromebook internet safety agreement before Chromebooks are issued.
